This aerial forest attraction features North America's largest outdoor trampolines.

Following the success of upla's first location in Mont Saint Grégoire, Quebec, which attracted over 100,000 guests in 2022, Treetop Trekking is excited to bring this unique concept to Ontario. Designed and produced by The Trekking Group, uplå is a suspended world that allows visitors to enjoy a playful experience in the treetops while having fun in a universe of nets.

"We are dedicated to making the great outdoors accessible to everyone, which is why we pushed the boundaries of outdoor recreation and created uplå, a revolutionary way for people to experience nature in a fun, active, and eco-friendly manner", said Jean-François Couture, Chief Marketing Officer at The Trekking Group. "Motivated by our

passion for nature, people, and authenticity, we chose to stay true to our roots by establishing our second uplå park in Ontario, despite a strong interest expressed by companies from all over North America".

The uplå park in Stouffville features a mega-trampoline with nine interconnected jumping surfaces, complete with pathways, a two-story trampoline, slides, vertical tunnels, and a spiral entrance, offering visitors a wide range of exciting activities to enjoy.

Treetop Trekking Stouffville is already one of the most prominent attractions in Bruce's Mill Conservation Park. The Stouffville park opened in 2014, and it is the most popular Treetop Trekking Park, attracting more visitors than the other six Ontario parks combined.

The Stouffville park is popular because of its proximity to the GTA, but also because it has the most amenities, beginning with the popular Zipline & Aerial Game Trek. Other activities include Treewalk Village, Discovery Kids Courses, Night Trek, Team Building Programs, GPS Rallies, and Forest

Bathing with a certified Forest Therapy Guide.

Proven to be a nearly "pandemic-proof" industry, Treetop drew more than 100,000 visitors to Bruce's Mill in 2022. With uplå, visitation counts could double.

"More importantly," said Town Economic Development Officer David Tuley, "When over 90% of Stouffville's landscape is protected as Greenbelt, we depend on innovative businesses like Treetop to create local jobs, improve the quality of life for residents and bring visitors to the community. ### NEW COMMUNITY HEALTH CLINIC OPENS Providing Health Care Access for Individuals without a Primary Care Provider

Oak Valley Health, in partnership with the Eastern York Region North Durham Ontario Health Team (EYRND OHT) and Well Plus Compounding Pharmacy, is pleased to announce the opening of a new Community Health Clinic.

The clinic opened on May 15 to provide health care access for individuals without a primary care provider, as well as care to individuals with COVID-19 symptoms. The clinic builds on the success the partners had in operating the COVID-19, Cold, and Flu Care Clinic (CCFCC).

A need for primary care in the community was identified, specifically for the unattached patient population, and as such, the Community Health Clinic was formed to serve Markham, Stouffville, and surrounding areas.

"I am pleased to be able to support our local hospital with the opening of the first and

only community health clinic in Stouffville. This is a much needed resource for our community and I am happy to be a partner of this initiative," said Mina Twfic, Owner, Well Plus Compounding Pharmacy.

Staffed by physicians and nurse practitioners (NPs), the clinic will serve as the gateway for health care for unattached patients to access primary care – from an initial appointment, to follow ups, and referrals as needed. Access to interprofessional care providers will be available.

The Community Health Clinic is meant to be a bridge for these patients until they find permanent primary care. Patients over the age of six months can be seen at the clinic.

The Community Health Clinic is located inside Well Plus Compounding Pharmacy, unit 5, 5402 Main St, Whitchurch-Stouffville. The clinic will be open from Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

#### YOU HEARD IT AT THE MAYOR'S DINNER Schlegel Villages Unveils Name for Stouffville Development

If you were attending the Mayor's Dinner 2023, you heard the name unveiling for Schlegel Villages' Stouffville development: The Village of Stouffer Mills. Schlegel undertakes a lengthy process to determine the right name for each of their villages, wanting to find a meaningful name for each of their locations.



The Village of Stouffer Mills honours the founder of Stouffville, Abraham Stouffer, who built and operated the first mills in Stouffville. Mills were common along the creeks in and around Stouffville in the 1800's to the mid 1900's.

Also exciting news: Schlegel Villages has partnered with Seneca College to operate a Living Classroom in Stouffville, providing post-secondary school education to train PSW's and other health care-related disciplines. The Living Classroom will open shortly after the completion of the Long-Term Care home.

The 192-bed Long-Term Care home on Hoover Park will start construction in 2023, and the first residents moving into their new home in 2025. Schlegel Villages will create 200 jobs in Stouffville upon opening of the LTC home, and 500 jobs after all 3 phases are completed. For more information see schlegelvillages.com

#### **Hockey Training Facility** Scheduled to open this Summer by Jim Mason

A new hockey training facility is scheduled to open in Stouffville this summer.

Around The Net (ATN) Hockey Skill Training is already at work in the community. After selling out its first hockey school during March Break, it has other sessions scheduled for this summer at the Stouffville Clippers Complex.

Construction at the bricks-and-mortar facility, located on Sandiford Drive, will begin this month with an August grand opening planned.

A hockey treadmill - with athletes wearing skates - will be the centrepiece of the operation. "Fifteen seconds on the treadmill is the equivalent of 45 seconds on the ice," said Scotty Howes, who founded ATN with his wife, Stouffville native Katie (Fretz) Howes, 10 years ago.

For what's regarded as a relatively small and niche industry, Tanis Emmett Wedding Style has managed to take the wedding industry by storm. Since it's founding in 2011, Tanis Emmett, Founder and Owner of Tanis Emmett Wedding Style, says they've had two expansions, and it looks like another one is on the books in the near future. Tanis Emmett Wedding Style primarily does luxury bridal alterations and redesigns. They serve clients locally, provincially, and internationally - it's not uncommon to have a bride-to-be fly in for a fitting – and support all the surrounding bridal boutiques.

The tremendous growth of Tanis Emmett Wedding Style has been almost all organic, and Tanis says that in the last month they've seen business increase by 38%, and year-to-date they are up 115%! They're so busy that they see a bride every 30-minutes to an hour, and even then, they are booked-up for appointments until the end of August. Thrifting brides, redesigns, and online orders has contributed to a lot of the growth that Tanis has been seeing over the last little while. Since online orders and thrifted dresses rarely fit brides-to-be as-is, their services are being needed more than ever. What's also adding to their growth is that there aren't many people that sew anymore, and the talent that is able to work with luxury garments and uncommon fabrics is even more scarce. Tanis has expanded beyond alterations and redesigns and has also moved into product manufacturing and training programs. Tanis boasts that they do everything in house as it relates to The Couture Saver, this includes bottle and box design. making the product, packing - they do

it all. The product is sold in wedding boutiques across the country and the demand for the product is huge.

The TEWS Education Academy is the other venture that Tanis is having great success with. Tanis says that during the COVID-19 pandemic it became apparent how little support there was in the bridal alterations industry, along with how few training programs existed. Out of this, Tanis launched the **TEWS Education Academy which offers** certification programs to bridal industry professionals. The certification program focuses on educating on bridal fittings and alterations, along with the intricate details and tools needed to elevate the experience offered to brides. Right now, the TEWS Education Academy is offered regionally, but the hope is to eventually take it internationally.

Tanis graduated from Fanshawe College's Fashion Design program and now serves on a board which congregates annually to review the curriculum offered to students. The fashion design industry is constantly evolving and being able to advise on what should be offered in the program helps to fosters students' success in the professional world upon graduation. She also offers new graduates from Fanshawe, Toronto Metropolitan University, and other surrounding fashion schools, internship opportunities, which allows them to get real life hands-on experience in the industry. #### **Major Rebates** Available for Heat Pump Tech and **Energy Efficiency**

#### Heat Pump, What?

I connected with Janet and Saul Esau of OnPoint Home Services, a heating and cooling business located on Ringwood Drive. They told me about the Canada Greener Homes program that provides a rebate of up to \$10,600 for the installation of heat pumps, amongst other things. Heat pumps are something that I vaguely understood. Heat pump technology has been very common in Europe, yet China is now leading the way in adoption. Almost half of the houses in America's South now use heat pumps. Heat pumps can make heat in the winter, and in reverse, remove heat in the summer (air conditioning).

There are several types of heat pump technology, one being ground-based, or geothermal, which is the 'cat's meow', but is beyond financial reach for most people. Air-source heat pumps are becoming popular-these are more affordable and have a quicker return on investment. Air-sourced pumps are either ductless (attached to the outside of a building) or are connected to new or existing ducts.

As long as you have electricity, heat pumps can be used in the countryside or in the city. You might shudder at the thought of heating with electricity, but under ideal conditions, a heat pump can transfer 300 percent more energy than it consumes. In extreme cold, heat pumps lose efficiency and may fail to keep you warm if it's minus 30 outside. You need backup, floorboard heaters, air handler, a wood-burning stove, etc. For those of you with natural gas, connect the heat pump to your existing furnace to create a "hybrid system".

In a hybrid system, when it gets really cold, a manual or automatic switch can flip your system from a heat pump to a gas furnace. The reduction in natural gas usage could be substantial. For example, if the switchover was set at -6c., the annual natural gas savings could be as much as 77%, while your heat pump would do most of the work during shoulder seasons. Also,

if electricity costs ramp up during peak periods, the switch could take place during these times as well.

I read that the return on investment for an air-source heat pump is 10 years, leaving you another 10 years to enjoy pure savings. Yes, these heat pumps cost roughly 20% more than conventional gas furnaces, but what if the Government of Canada rebates most of the cost? What if your new hybrid system cost \$2,000 instead of \$10,000 (very rough numbers)? The ROI would respectfully, be sooner and better. If you need further motivation, in southern Ontario homes and buildings generate about 57 percent of greenhouse gas emissions, mainly for heating and hot water. If we want to get serious about greenhouse emission reduction, heat pumps are the

low-hanging fruit.

#### Better Call Saul

Think of Janet and Saul, and others like them, as your navigators. They can assess your situation and make a recommendation, as Janet says, "bigger isn't always better" (or more efficient). Your residence may require a unit, being super small or larger, that isn't on the government's pre-qualification system yet. Your house could be so

> old and energy-inefficient that the government will prefer that you insulate it first (there are grants for this too, sometimes 100% free for seniors and vulnerable populations - ask Janet about this).

> After you figure out what you think you need, with the help of your local Heating and Cooling experts, that's when the process begins. The inspector will contact you to go through some qualifying questions as the government has mandated a pre-andpost inspection. If you are hung up on the term "rebate", it is for good reasons-money is needed upfront to get a rebate, but Janet and Saul have access to a lender that, if you qualify, will provide a 0% interest loan until the rebate comes. The inspector OnPoint works with can assist with navigating the rebate. When the project is complete and has passed a post-retrofit inspection, "you will receive a cheque for the grant by mail within 30 business days," states the Natural Resources Canada website.

#### Lemonville Community Centre 13453 McCowan Road

The Lemonville School - celebrating its 100th anniversary this year - was constructed in 1923 as S.S. #9 and enlarged in 1959 by adding a second classroom. The school was closed in 1969 and reopened as the Lemonville Community Centre in 1972. Doors Open visitors can view a pop-up exhibit and chat with volunteers about the building's fascinating history.

#### Lemonville United Church 13523 McCowan Road

The initial services of the Lemonville Methodist Church began in 1854 in a frame schoolhouse. In 1856, the original church building was constructed on the present site. During Doors Open, visit Lemonville United for refreshments, guided tours, historical displays and information, and speak to members of the congregation about its social and architectural significance.

#### W-S Museum & Community Ctr. 14732 Woodbine Avenue

Located in the hamlet of Vandorf, the Whitchurch-Stouffville Museum & Community Centre has preserved the town's rich heritage since 1971. During Doors Open, join outdoor expert Jonathan Thompson to learn about Indigenous fire-making techniques including demonstrations on flint and steel, bow drill, two-person bow drill, hand drill and modern techniques. Visitors can also explore the museum's buildings and galleries.

#### Wesley United Church 15296 Woodbine Avenue

Built in 1881, this Gothic style Church contains beautiful stained-glass windows and other unique features including boards from







#### Mar Thoma Church 159 Sandiford Drive

St. Thomas Christians can trace their origins to the arrival of St. Thomas on a lagoon in Malankara, India. Built in 2017, this 2,137-square-metre (23,000-square-foot) building contains a beautiful 750-seat sanctuary, seniors' recreational room, youth room and spectacular chandeliers. Take a guided tour, browse exhibits to learn about faith, beliefs and rich cultural heritage, and stop by the food sale.

#### Richardson Lodge No.136 279 Second Street

Built in 1955, Richardson Masonic Lodge prides itself as a well-established institution dedicated to the cultural, social and moral development of men 21 years of age and older. The building will offer self-guided tours, presentations of the history of Richardson Lodge Masonic Hall, giveaways, and light refreshments. Also be sure to check out the sundial out front!



This designated heritage home, built in 1885 for the village veterinarian, currently houses the offices of Morra Caruso Law. It features the original dining room pocket doors, large, crafted wood baseboards and plaster crown moulding. Take a staff-led tour and enjoy refreshments and a presentation of photos in the boardroom.



Built in 1896 and originally designed as a market and concert hall, this building has been used for many purposes over the years. Join musician and educator Joy Lapps-Lewis



for an engaging workshop to explore the rich history of the steelpan and play instruments including skinned drums, tamboo bamboo, iron, and other percussion instruments that are cornerstones of steelpan history.

# Latcham Art Centre 2 Park Drive

The Latcham Art Centre is Stouffville's only public art gallery. Join curator Tyler Durbano for tours of the current exhibition What We Tend by Emmanuel Osahor. Or create your own picnic basket, food and flowers with a variety of art materials for the Garden Picnic project. Also, speak with professional artists about the process of showing/curating shows in professional galleries.

# <sup>13</sup> W-S Public Library 2 Park Drive

The Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library traces its history back to 1877 when it was first established in Allan's Jewelry Store, then as the Mechanic's Institute, and finally as a free public library in 1899. Enjoy a behindthe-scenes look at the library's automated material handler, food-themed button-making, 3D printer demonstrations, and a cookbook display.

#### Jean-Baptiste Lainé Site 99 Reeves Way Boulevard

The Jean-Baptiste Lainé Site was home to a remarkable late-16th-century ancestral Wendat community. Of all the sites in Southern Ontario that have been almost completely excavated, it is considered one of the largest and most complex. Explore and learn about this amazing archaeological site with self-guided tours and a staffed interpretation table. Park at Wendat Village Public School (99 Reeves Way Boulevard) and follow signage.

2023 WHITCHURCH-**STOUFFVILLE** Heritage Awards

In 2022, the Town of Stouffville launched the inaugural Whitchurch-Stouffville Heritage Awards.

With acknowledgement that this land is the treaty territory of the Williams Nations, the traditional territory of other Anishinaabeg peoples, including the Wendat and the Haudenosaunee, the Town has set out to recognize and promote its heritage properties.

From its founding in 1804, through the pre & post-Confederation eras, and into the early 1900s, Stouffville's built heritage reflects a variety of architectural styles.

Today there are over 700 properties listed in the Town's "Built Heritage Inventory". It is with the Town's rich history in mind, that eligible individuals, corporations, and organizations having made an extraordinary effort towards the conservation,





restoration, or adaptive reuse of a built heritage property were nominated.

This year's recipients are 72 Church Street (residential) and 13453 McCowan Road (commercial).

Built circa 1892 by master builder Nathan Forsyth (b.1852-d.1946), 72 Church Street was built for Samuel Burkholder who operated a local furniture and undertaking business. Located in the core of the Village of Stouffville, this building represents Late Victorian Hybrid style and is unique with its Romanesque Revival and Italianate details and embellishments. Forsyth's style is evident in the distinguishable deep red brick and use of decorative and sculptural brickwork, corbelled brick string courses, voussoir trims, porch/balcony projections, decorative woodwork on brackets and window transoms. The house was converted into apartments around 1941 and it does not have any appearance of additions or renovations. As a result, the architectural design and heritage features have remained intact. It appears that the property has been well-maintained and lovingly looked after. The building stands in all its glory and retains most of its unique architectural and heritage integrity.

You may be familiar with the Lemonville Community Centre, formerly Lemonville School, located at 13453 McCowan Road. Built around 1923 to replace the hamlet's original schoolhouse, the building became a community centre in 1971 with the help of a generous donation from Arthur Latcham to expand the building and add "bell towers". The addition is distinct but remains well-integrated and sympathetic to the original structure and architectural style. Now a significant landmark, the schoolhouse was essential to the development of the community before becoming a community hub. The Lemonville Community Center boasts its history with humility and celebrates its "Centennial" this year.

The Whitchurch-Stouffville Heritage Awards will be handed out at 9:00am on June 3 as we celebrate 100 Years of the Lemonville Community Centre, followed by the kick-off to Doors Open Whitchurch-Stouffville.

I had the pleasure of sitting down to chat with 2 local Stouffville young men who are making a name for themselves with a new business they've started called Next Level Epoxy. They will take care of refinishing any concrete floor you have and turn your dreams into reality! You house will be the talk of the neighbourhood!

I first saw the ads in a local Facebook group and was intrigued with the look, the process and especially the longevity of epoxy flooring, so I put in a call, had a visit from one of the company owners, had a good chat and thought we need to spread the word!

The company was started by and is owned by brothers Mitchell and Jaden Delic, 2 entrepreneurs that are excited, enthusiastic, and professional with their new corporate hats on. #### THE SEASON OF SUMMER A trip to the Cottage

screams summer more than cooking outdoors on a BBQ. Whether you are at the lake, the beach or your backyard, cooking up a delicious meal is the perfect way to spend a warm summer evening. In this article, I am going to share with you some delicious food I made while visiting friends at their cottage. On the menu, short ribs, chicken souvlaki, sausage, lemon garlic potatoes, and Greek salad.

#### Short Ribs

Short ribs are a crowd-pleaser and for a good reason. They are juicy, tender and delicious. Before my short ribs hit the grill I marinate them. I made a simple red wine marinade with a 1/2 cup of red wine, 2 tbsp of olive oil, 2 tbsp of soy sauce, 2 tablespoons of honey, 2 cloves garlic minced, 1 teaspoon of dried thyme, and 1 teaspoon of smoked paprika. Place the short ribs with marinade you will need to add more water to top it up. in a large plastic bag, seal and refrigerate for at least four hours or overnight.

medium-high heat. Remove the short ribs from the marinade and discard the excess liquid. Put the short ribs on the grill and cook them for 6 to 8 minutes per side or until they are cooked to your desired level of doneness. Let them rest for a few minutes before serving.....So Good!

#### Chicken Souvlaki

Chicken souvlaki is perfect for summer grilling. The key to perfect chicken souvlaki is to marinate the chicken for at least four hours or overnight if possible. This will ensure that the meat is juicy and tender.

For the marinade, combine 4 tbsps olive oil, the juice of 1 lemon, 1 clove of garlic minced, 2 tbsp dried oregano, 1 teaspoon of dried thyme, salt and freshly ground pepper. Cut your chicken breast into minimum 1-inch cubes and place the chicken in a large plastic bag and pour the marinade in and mix it around to make sure all the meat is covered. Seal the bag and refrigerate for at least four hours or overnight.

Preheat your grill to medium-high heat. Remove the chicken from the marinade discarding the excess liquid. Thread the chicken onto skewers, and then it's time to get them on the grill. Don't overcook them,

Cottage season is upon us, and nothing and definitely don't undercook them. If you are unsure of your cook time, use a meat thermometer.

#### **Sausage and Lemon Garlic Potatoes**

Sausage, well, this one is easy, buy your favourite links and get them on the grill. Lemon Garlic Potatoes is a classic dish for me that is easy to prepare and always a hit. I have a special pan that I use for this recipe, a 10" round deep-dish pizza pan... it's perfect for this. I use red and yellow mini potatoes, wash them, and put them in the pan. Mix together 1/3 cup olive oil, 1 cup water, 3 cloves chopped garlic, 2 tbsp fresh rosemary coarsely chopped, 1 tbsp fresh thyme chopped, 1 chicken stock cube, and the juice of 1/2 a lemon. Make sure you break up the chicken cube well and mix throughout. Now pour that mixture over the potatoes. Depending on the size of your pan Get the water level to just below the top of the potatoes. Put them on the BBQ on med-Time to cook them. Preheat your grill to high and cook until done. Make sure you check them and add water if it gets too low.

#### **Greek Salad**

No summer meal is complete without a fresh and flavourful Greek salad. This salad is easy to prepare and is the perfect side dish.

To make the salad, start by preparing the dressing. In a small bowl, whisk together 1/4 cup of olive oil, 2 tablespoons of red wine vinegar, 1 teaspoon of dried oregano, 1 teaspoon of Dijon mustard and a pinch of

salt and pepper.

In a large bowl, combine one chopped cucumber, one chopped red onion, a cup of halved cherry tomatoes, and a cup of crumbled feta cheese. Pour the dressing over the salad and toss everything together until it is well-coated.

Serve the salad alongside the short ribs, chicken souvlaki, sausage and garlic potatoes for a complete and delicious summer meal.

In conclusion, cooking outdoors at the cottage around the BBQ is a great way to enjoy the warm summer and create delicious meals for your family and friends. The best thing is... #### **GORDON LIGHTFOOT Stouffville Musicians Pay** Tribute to Canada's Bard

The death of Gordon Lightfoot on May 1 triggered a groundswell of tributes and tears from Canada and abroad as people of all ages mourned this country's iconic Canadian singer-songwriter whose music became a part of the tapestry of our lives for more than half a century.

A musician's musician, Gordon was held in the highest esteem by his peers. His songs have been covered by countless artists including Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan, Barbra Streisand, Anne Murray and Neil Young. "Every time I hear a song of his I wish it would last forever," Mr. Dylan once said. From Jimmy Buffet, a huge pop star in the 1970s and 80s: "If you think you hear a bit of Lightfoot in my music you're right," he admitted. "He was the greatness my mediocrity tried to imitate."

Here in Stouffville, 'Early Morning Rain: The Legend of Gordon Lightfoot', the touring concert starring Toronto's Musician of the Year Leisa Way & The Wayward Wind Band, played at 19 On the Park on May 19. The show was originally billed as "A Celebration of a Living Legend" when it was booked here earlier this year. It had played at the Orillia Opera House in Gordon's hometown five days after he died.

I reached out to Stouffville's two-time Juno Award nominee, Canadian Reggae Award winner and bestselling author Jason Wilson for his reaction to the passing of

the nation's noted troubadour/balladeer. "I was speaking to my mom on the phone and asked her if she had heard that Gordon had passed," Jason began. "She said yes, but that she didn't think she knew any of his songs." Jason proceeded to sing an assortment of Lightfoot tunes, with his mom acknowledging each one. "Now quite moved, my mom could only manage through her blubbering: 'I love him!' In the process of singing, I too had teared up. I realized at that moment how important he had been to me as a songwriter. And that's the thing about Gordon Lightfoot: His vast canon of Canadiana is so interwoven with our own individual narratives that we sometimes lose count and forget that these matchless songs have all come down to us from one solitary and irreplaceable source."

Mike Burns, a local singer and guitarist who has performed through the decades at countless venues throughout York and Durham Regions as well as at numerous charity events including the African Children Villages production at Massey Hall, told me he how he had grown up on Gordon's music. "His Canadian Railroad Trilogy and Don Quixote are masterpieces - in fact, most of his music is!" he said.

As a cover artist, Mike said it is important for him to have a broad repertoire of music. "With me being over 60, it has to include a good selection of Gordon Lightfoot tunes. I

often ask for requests at gigs, and I'm always asked if I can do 'The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald', or simply 'Can you do any Gord Lightfoot.' Gord's music gives me energy and a brilliant source of material to entertain folks in my own small way. What a great man and what a great Canadian."

Rick Lighfoot (no relation to Gordon), a folk music hobbyist who has played with Stouffville's noted Albert Street Four at countless events here in town through the decades, was a follower of the folk revival of the early 1960s. He vividly recalls the emergence of a new voice on the Toronto folk music scene back then. "A balladeer who performed locally, one whom I could see often on Yonge St. and in the Yorkville Village - Gordon Lightfoot. One who wrote his own material with songs about love and loss, historical events, and the majesty of Canada."

Rick said he became "a bit of a groupie" and from then on Gordon was his idol. "I took in many Gordie concerts over the next 60 years. For me, he single-handedly kept my love for the long faded folk genre alive over the past 6 decades."

Rick reflected upon the signature line from Don McLean's classic 1970s hit American Pie in mirroring the sentiments of many who mourned the loss of Gordon Lightfoot. "The news of his passing, as the song said, was 'the day the music died.' "

#### MCINTYRE SHINES ON THE ICE, IN THE CLASSROOM Stouffville product scores Ontario Hockey League's Roger Neilson academic award

When he wasn't scoring goals for the arena. Oshawa Generals, Stouffville's Ryder McIntyre was netting great grades in his university classes. So much so that he is the 2022-23 recipient of the Roger Neilson Memorial Award presented annually to the Ontario Hockey League's Top Academic postsecondary student.

McIntyre achieved an overall average of 81 percent in studies at the University of Guelph, including a 100-percent grade in an introduction to marketing course and a 95-percent in human development. McIntyre's course load also included psychology and microeconomics.

That's on top of being at the rink from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. most weekdays for on and office work. Games are played on weekends. Mondays are for rest.

What's the secret to acing your schoolwork while playing sports at such an elite level?

"It can be a long day, but the teams I've been on really preach going to school," McIntyre told OTR at his family's home just north of downtown Stouffville. "I enjoy both. Going to school helped me be more structured for hockey. One set me up for the other. "When I wasn't going to school, I found I was just loafing. But I like to be busy, not just playing video games."

That includes "finding time" for studying, be it at his billet's home in Oshawa or the public library near the Generals' downtown

Finances aren't an issue. All education costs for players, including tuition and books, are covered by their OHL teams. He thanked his parents for the guidance and the Generals for providing "the proper environment to make this possible."

The big - 6-foot-3, 221 pounds - 18-yearold had seven goals and 10 assists during 63 games between the Generals and the Sarnia Sting in 2022-23. He was acquired by the Generals from Sarnia on Oct. 20, 2022.

McIntyre, who attended Bill Crothers Secondary School in Unionville while living in Stouffville, began his online university courses last fall while playing in Sarnia.

"It's not a surprise to me that Ryder has won this prestigious academic award," said Generals Vice-President and General Manager Roger Hunt. "He is a young man that is very capable of prioritizing things and has a great work ethic. He works as hard in the gym, on the ice and in the classroom – a great formula for young people to follow if you want to succeed in life."

A third-round (51st overall) pick by Sarnia in the 2020 OHL U16 draft, McIntyre's top performance this past season came on Feb. 20 when he recorded a goal and two assists in a 10-7 win over the Niagara IceDogs. He began playing as a four-year-old. spending his first five years in the Whitchurch-Stouffville Minor Hockey Association. His pre-university marks were in the 90s.
