Household Battery Recycling Program

Residents are now able to drop-off their used and unwanted household batteries in the bins provided at the following facilities:

- Whitchurch-Stouffville Leisure Centre, 2 Park Drive
- Whitchurch-Stouffville Municipal Offices, 111 Sandiford Drive

Batteries are considered hazardous waste and are not accepted with regular waste collection. Please drop-off your batteries to be recycled.



Storage bags can be picked up at the Municipal Offices (111 Sandiford Drive) or the Leisure Centre and Library (2 Park Drive).

Curbside Collection Reminders





Place garbage, green bins, blue boxes and vard waste at the curb by 7 a.m. on your scheduled day, but not earlier than 5 p.m. the night before. Please do not leave empty bins and uncollected material at the curb after your collection day. There is a maximum three (3) bag limit every two weeks. Additional bags will also be collected provided a "Garbage Bag Tag" is affixed to each bag. Tags may be purchased for cash only at stores for a cost of \$2* (including HST) each at the following locations:

Acceptable Containers for Garbage

Plastic cans

- Must have open handle(s) and a secure removable lid
- No metal cans
- Do not use ties/bungee cords
- Maximum 125 litres (4.4 cu ft)
- Maximum weight 23 kg (50 lbs)
- Loose items must be contained in bags within the can
- Cans must not be overflowing

Plastic bags

- Must be securely tied
- No loose grocery/kitchen catcher bags
- Do not place sharp objects inside bags. Place these materials in a separate, sealed and labeled cardboard box
- Maximum weight 23 kg (50 lbs)
- Broken Glass should be put out for collection in a sealed cardboard box and clearly marked as to its contents

The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville is not responsible for lost or stolen bins or for non-approved containers being collected or returned after collection.

Please leave blue and green bins behind. New bins will be provided for your







Approved Recycling Containers:

Town issued blue boxes, 65 cm (26 inches) in length, 50 cm (20 inches) in width and 50 cm (20 inches) in height. Only town issued green bins will be accepted for collection.

Magazines, newspapers, cardboard and other paper tied securely in bundles:

90 cm x 90 cm x 30 cm (36 x 36 x 12 inches). Cardboard boxes are not acceptable containers for garbage or recycling material and will not be collected.

Approved Garbage Containers:

Maximum Size: 90 cm H x 50 cm diameter (125 litres, 4.4 cu. ft.) Total Weight: 23 kg (50 lbs)





OOPS!

Missed collections are upsetting, but there is usually a reason why material was not collected as expected.

In order for your materials to be collected, please ensure they are:

- In acceptable containers, recyclables will NOT be collected in plastic bags or cardboard boxes. Please do not cover the container with a net or lid. Please see page 1 for approved container sizes.
- Out by 7 a.m.
- Within the weight limit of 23 kg (50 lbs)
- Not hidden behind a vehicle, snow bank, or other obstruction

- Free of prohibited content (e.g. hazardous or construction/renovation waste/medical waste)
- Lids of green bins should be closed and locked. Green bins with materials overflowing will not be collected. Additional bins can be purchased from the Town's website at townofws.ca.

Other reasons for missed collections are:

- Non-recyclable item in Blue Box, including Styrofoam takeout trays/ containers, plastic bags/film plastic (including plastic around water/pop cases). Please ensure the plastic is removed from these items. Please ensure plastic bags are also removed from newspapers
- Recyclables were not rinsed. Containers that have food/liquid residue left in them attract animals and bees/wasps and pose a health and safety risk to drivers. Please rinse all food and beverage containers before placing in your blue box
- Plastic bags in the green bin, all items must be placed in compostable bags
- Grass clippings were found in yard waste bags/containers
- Items were placed too far away from curb/shoulder or exceeds bag/container limit
- Cardboard was not bundled or bundles were too large. Loose cardboard should be bundled no larger than 90 cm x 90 cm x 30 cm (36" x 36"x 12")

- Furnace filters are not recyclable
- Loose items in garbage can, all material must be contained in bags within the can.
- Blue box was too large, blue box recycling materials will be collected only in a proper Town approved blue box. Please see page 1 for proper container sizes.
 The overall weight, size and durability of these containers prevent safe and effective collection
- Shredded paper is only collected in the green bin, blue boxes containing shredded paper will not be collected
- Electronic Waste must be recycled. Please take these items to one of the Region's Electronic Recycling Depots listed on Page 3 or to one of the Town's Electronic Recycling Events held in May and October. Electronic Waste can also be dropped off at The Care and Share Thrift Shop, 33 Ringwood Drive, Stouffville.

If an item is not collected for reasons other than the above, please call 1-866-421-5625.

Tips for a Problem Free Collection!

Please see page 1 for approved container sizes.

Styrofoam (including meat trays and takeout containers) are not recyclable. Please remove these items and place in the garbage.



Please do not put recyclables in cardboard boxes. This poses a safety hazard for collection staff as cardboard boxes are not very sturdy especially after sitting out in the rain and snow. All recyclable material should be in a Town issued blue box and cardboard should be flattened and bundled no larger than 90 cm x 90 cm x 30 cm (36" x 36" x 12").



Please remove all bungee cords before setting green bin out for collection.

Please remove all film plastic wrapping and plastic bags. This includes the plastic bags that the newspaper arrives in.



Please do not throw large piles of material at the curb. This is dangerous for collectors. Please ensure all material is bagged properly and bulk items are set neatly beside them. Tags for additional bags can be purchased at the locations stated on page 1 of this calendar.



Helpful Reminders for Recycling on Windy Days

Avoid having your residential street look like this on your recycling day. On strong windy days, make sure your recycling items stay in your blue box until collection.

- Place heavier items such as books and magazines on top of the lighter items. Bundle cardboard, newspapers and magazines separately. These bundles can act as a 'lid' for your blue box.
- Do not place non-recyclable material in your blue bins such as plastic bags, Styrofoam or disposable coffee/take-out cups.
 These items should go in the garbage.
- Do not overfill your blue box, keep material below the rim to prevent the wind from catching it and blowing it out of the bin.
 There is no limit to the number of blue boxes put out for weekly collection.
 Additional bins can be purchased through our website at townofws.ca.
- Do not stack blue boxes. If the wind is strong enough it will blow these bins over, causing recyclables to spill all over the street.
- Do not place bins on top of snowbanks. Not only does this create a
 health and safety issue for collection crews as they may slip and fall
 while retrieving the bins, the bins are at greater risk of blowing over and
 material falling out. Bins should be placed at edge of curb on the driveway,
 never on the road.
- Remove all empty blue and green bins from the curb after collection as soon as possible. Lost bins will not be replaced.

What Goes in the Green Bin?

Food and Food Scraps

If you can eat it, it goes in the Green Bin. Meat and fish bones and shells, fat, grease and lard (solidified), small amounts of cooking oil, fruits and vegetables, baking supplies, dairy products, egg shells, coffee filters/grounds and tea bags, corn cobs/husks and nuts/shells.

Soiled or Shredded Paper

Shredded paper may be placed in the Green Bin in small amounts. Other paper products that go in the Green Bin include: butcher and cheese paper (non-waxed), microwave popcorn bags, flour and sugar bags, muffin paper, soiled paper plates, paper towels and tissues, paper serviettes, and any non-waxed paper or cardboard that contains food residue (sauce, cheese, etc.). NO waxed paper.

Personal Care Items

Diapers, hair, nail clippings, sanitary products, tampons, incontinence products, tissues.

Pet Products

Animal bedding, pet waste, kitty litter, bird seed, pet food, pet fur, feathers and sawdust (wood sources only).

Houseplants and Flowers

In small quantities only, no yard waste

Green Bin Tip: Only certified compostable bags or paper-based bags break down completely during the composting process. Look for this logo on the packaging to be sure you are purchasing the best product for the environment. Biodegradable bags break down into smaller pieces of plastic that will not decompose and will become a contaminant in the finished compost.





Only Town issued green bins will be accepted for collection. Do NOT place yard waste in the Green Bin



Important!

All organic material, such as food waste, must be contained in compostable bags that are securely closed or tied in the green bin. Bags placed on top of the bin will not be collected.

There are two options:

Option #1: Recommended

Line your small kitchen container with a compostable bag. Fill your kitchen container with organics. Transfer your tied organic-filled bag into your Green Bin. Place your Green Bin at the curb on your collection day.



or

Option #2:

Line your Green Bin with a compostable bag. Fill your small kitchen container with organics (no bag). Empty the loose organic material from your small kitchen



container into your lined Green Bin. Tie your Green Bin liner closed. Place your Green Bin at the curb on your collection day. Please do not double bag materials.



Yard Waste

Yard Waste is collected ON YOUR REGULAR COLLECTION DAY **EVERY SECOND WEEK** starting in April, as noted throughout this calendar (there are some exceptions due to statutory holidays).

There is no limit on the amount of yard waste that can be placed for collection, providing that acceptable bags and/or containers are used.

Acceptable Containers:

Place weeds, plant trimmings and leaves in paper yard waste bags or an open-top garbage can labelled "Yard Waste" (stickers available from the Municipal Offices). Blue boxes are for recycling material only and will not be accepted for yard waste collection.

NO plastic bags please!

Rundle branches as shown Use twine only, no ropes please.



These items should NOT be placed with Yard Waste:

Kitchen scraps, grass clippings, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, larger branches, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood and animal droppings.


Please do not place yard waste bags at the curb before collection day. Bags left outdoors in the elements deteriorate very quickly and can cause problems for collection crews by ripping and falling apart. Crews are not responsible for collecting ripped or torn bags.






FIGHT THE BITE! AGAINST BLACKLEGGED TICKS AND LYME DISEASE

What is Lyme disease?

· Fatigue or

weakness



Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria called Borrelia burgdorferi which is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

Symptoms of Lyme disease may include:

- A skin rash
 Fever or chills

 - · Dizziness or confusion
 - Muscle and joint pain
- Headache Swollen lymph nodes


See your health care provider if you develop symptoms of Lyme disease after a tick bite or after visiting a wooded or brushy area.

What are blacklegged ticks?

- Ticks are small bugs that feed off the blood of animals and humans
- · Adult ticks are the size of a sesame seed and nymphs are the size of a poppy seed
- Ticks are found on tall grasses and bushes in wooded areas
- They can attach and feed up to five days

Protect yourself in wooded or brushy areas

- · Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved clothing and closed footwear
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- · Walk in the middle of trails
- · Shower when you get home
- · Check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks
- Remove attached ticks as soon as possible



If you find a tick on you or a family member remove it quickly



- 1. Grasp the tick with tweezers as close as possible to your skin and pull it straight out
- 2. Do not put anything on the tick or try to burn it off
- 3. Disinfect the area with rubbing alcohol
- 4. Visit etick.ca for FREE tick identification

What is West Nile virus? West Nile virus is spread to humans from the bite of an infected mosquito.

How to protect yourself when outdoors

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved shirts and pants
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- Cover up at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active



How York Region protects you

York Region's West Nile Virus Program includes larviciding over 100,000 catch basins during the summer and using mosquito traps to capture and test for West Nile virus infected mosquitoes.



Mosquito-proof your home


- Clean up areas of standing water around your home
- Ensure door and window screens are tight-fitting and in good repair
- Clean up pools / pool covers
- Turn over wading pools
- · Empty out flower pots
- Clear eavestroughs, storm and roof gutters
- Clean bird baths weekly
- Empty water in old tires

What is Household Hazardous Waste?



Household hazardous waste (HHW) is anything in your home that is corrosive, explosive, flammable or poisonous and is no longer needed. It should be brought to a HHW depot where it will be disposed of safely.

Examples of HHW:

- Aerosol cans (full or partially full)
- Batteries
- Cleaning products
- Cosmetics
- Fertilizers
- Fluorescent light bulbs and tubes
- Gasoline (containers may not be returned)
- Glues and adhesives
- Nail polish and polish remover
- Paints (liquid and solid)

- Paint thinner and varnish remover.
- Perfume and cologne
- Pesticides, insecticides and herbicides
- Pharmaceuticals
- Propane cylinders/tanks
- Pool chemicals
- Sharps (needles/syringes) must be in puncture proof container
- Used motor oil and filters

Residents can drop off 60L of household hazardous waste and 20 compact fluorescent tubes per household per day.

What is Electronic Waste?



Electronic waste (e-waste) is any electronic equipment in your home that no longer works and cannot be repaired. E-waste should not be thrown in the garbage as these items contain materials considered to be hazardous.

Examples of e-waste:

- Cables
- Cameras and camcorders
- Cell phones, telephones, pagers and fax machines
- Computer towers, laptops, tablets, modems, keyboards and mice

- Game systems
- Monitors, printers, scanners and typewriters
- Televisions
- VCRs, DVD players, radios, stereos, speakers

Maximum 50 kg per household per day. Remove all packaging and batteries. Disassembled electronics will not be accepted.



Textile Recycling

Residents of Whitchurch-Stouffville are now able to contribute cloth items and home décor of any kind including clothing, curtains, towels and bed sheets. Gently worn and reusable items are welcome, as well as any clean, dry and odourless items. This includes ripped or damaged textiles and items such as purses or eyeglasses.

Drop-Off Bins

Whitchurch-Stouffville residents are able to re-purpose unwanted clothing, textiles and cloth households items by dropping off items at local Textile Waste Collection bins 24-hours a day.



Metal Item Recycling • Bulky Item Pick-up

Large Metal Items

Large metal items such as appliances, barbecues (no propane tanks), bed frames, furnaces, hot water heaters, metal bath tubs, storage sheds and bicycles must be recycled. Call **1-866-421-5625** to arrange for a special curbside collection.

NOTE: For safety, remove doors from fridges, freezers, dishwashers and ovens.

If a special collection is not booked with the contractor, metal items will not be collected. Metal appliances and scrap metal can also be dropped off at select York Region depots (see page 3 for details).

Bulky Item (Large Articles) Pick-Up is limited to four (4) large household items per collection, not extra bags or boxes or large amounts of waste. The Town and GFL reserves the right to refuse collection if the items put out interfere or impact driver safety (i.e. large piles of materials placed curbside) or operations.

Residents are asked to take large amounts of waste to one of the Region's Community Environmental Centres (see page 3). Most items can be recycled.

Furniture, Mattresses, Box Springs, Plastic Lawn Furniture, Toilets, Carpeting, etc.

Items to be placed at curbside for pick-up on your regular garbage collection day. Bundle small loose pieces. Tie carpeting and linoleum in rolls measuring no longer than 1.2 metres (4 ft) and weighing less than 23 kilograms (50 lbs), up to ten (10) rolls per collection. **Toilets must be separated into two pieces (tank/bowl) and drained for collection**. Electronics are not collected curbside. Items containing glass will not be collected unless the glass has been removed. Please see page 7 for broken glass disposal.

Construction & Demolition Waste

Construction and demolition waste is not collected curbside. Please take these materials to one of the York Region Community Environmental Centres. See page 3 for locations and hours of operation or donate good guality materials to a charitable organization.

Please help keep your neighbourhood clutter free and do not place metal or bulky items out before your scheduled collection day. This is a By-law violation and could result in a fine.








- Flyers

Remove lids and place separately in the blue box.

What goes green bin?

All green bin waste must be BAGGED and TIED.

- All foods (cooked, raw, bones or spoiled)
- Diapers
- Paper products
 - Food-soiled cardboard
 - Food-soiled newspaper
 - Paper towels
 - Shredded paper (small amounts)
 - Tissues
- Personal hygiene products
- Pet/animal waste

What does NOT go in the green bin?

- Baby/cleaning wipes
- Clothing Cutlery
- Dryer lint

- Plastic bags/film Plastic food containers
